



Pennypack Trust was established in 1970.

2020 marks 50 years of preserving and restoring land for this and future generations.

Over the last half-century, we have assembled 852 acres of diverse landscape through a combination of land purchase and private property donation by generous and environmentally minded citizens that want to see land protected and managed responsibly.

Our land trust serves the community by providing space for recreation, habitat respite for animals, replenishing groundwater that we rely on for drinking water, and buffering storm-water runoff, which keeps our creeks clean.

The Land Trust Model

Most people consider forests, parks and other open spaces as government owned, but that's not always true.

As a private, non-profit, member-based organization, we do not receive any funding from federal, state or county governments.

We are entirely privately owned, yet completely open to the public. With open space protection as our central mission, we remain ever vigilant in curbing development and preserving habitat.

Protected open spaces throughout the country are made possible by the cooperation and support of private property owners and member-supported land trusts like ours.


